from the finance council:

The 2020-2021 fiscal year has been one of the most unusual years we have ever seen. The COVID-19 pandemic brought extraordinary changes to the way we work, volunteer, travel, communicate, and support each other. It has even changed some of the ways we worship and pray together.

The Finance Council would like to express our thanks and appreciation for all your prayers and support during this most historic year. We present this Annual Report on the status of the finances of the parish for the period July 2020 to June 2021. It is designed to provide transparency regarding our parish finances, including sources of funding, major operating expenses, and capital investments made in the parish during the fiscal year.

More information is included later in this report, but a few highlights include:

- Offertory collections of \$1,339,955 for the year.
- Bequest gifts received in the amount of \$156,748. As stated in our bequest policy, half of bequests is invested in our Legacy Fund, while the other half is used for operations.
- We made capital investments of \$25,892 in the parish during the year which include the LED altar lighting and the corner shrine. Other major fiscal year improvements of \$148,538 include painting and carpeting of the worship space and chapel, and resurfacing the upper parking lot.

This year, the purpose of the Annual Report is two-fold. In addition to a financial update, we also want to recognize the parish staff, our leadership, our six commissions, and our amazing volunteers who did an incredible job of adapting to the circumstances of the pandemic. We are grateful to God for sustaining all of us during this past year and enabling us to serve those in our community in their time of great need. We hope this report illustrates how together we were able to offer creative alternatives to our regular programs and groups. **Read on!**

Administration

The Administration Commission's responsibilities include maintaining the building, coordinating how money is acquired and spent, and communicating to parishioners about what is happening in the parish. While the pandemic made everything more complicated, we still accomplished many things in 2021.

The Building and Grounds Committee completed several indoor projects, including replacing the altar lighting with LED fixtures, replacing the carpeting in the worship area and chapel, repainting the ceiling in the worship area, removing the wallpaper and repainting the Auditorium, and adding corner lighting for the statues of Blessed Virgin Mary and Joseph in the worship area. Outdoors, they coordinated a couple of Eagle Scout service projects which included a planted border along the west side of the church, and a patio outside the youth room. They also planned this spring's tree trimming, the recent resurfacing of the upper parking lot, and roofing maintenance and repairs.

Communications remained focused on reaching people in various ways. As the pandemic continued, we maximized our digital communication strategies including Facebook posts, emails, eBlasts and more. Video recordings of Masses were already part of our YouTube channel, but early in the fiscal year when live-streaming began, we adapted our website to allow parishioners to watch live Mass and funeral services.

We continued to create a bulletin every week to keep it available to those who subscribe from the bulletin site, for our weekly eBlast, to have copies in our chapel vestibule, and to send to our mailing list. This was one of the few paper

communications we were still able to still produce, since they are printed by our bulletin publisher, LPi, and didn't require on-site staff or volunteers. Other printed pieces included Advent/Christmas, Lent, and Holy Week postcards similar to those in past years, the Annual Report and Stewardship Renewal materials.

The Parish Council met virtually each month throughout the year. One highlight was choosing Catholic Leadership Institute as parish coach to discern where we are as a parish and where we want to be in the years to come. Current members helped recruit the new members chosen by ritual on Pentecost Sunday, including Corrine Kaminski, Jen Millikin and Kristi Rollwagen.

Other committees in the Administration Commission faced and overcame various obstacles:

- A skeleton crew planned the annual Stewardship Renewal campaign
- The Finance Council tasked department heads with reworking their annual budgets into quarterly budgets
- The Money Counters had only two or three people to do the Monday counts
- The Lock Up Crew adjusted and readjusted schedules and remained flexible throughout the pandemic as the situation evolved

Four new faces joined our administrative staff this year: Diane Swenson, Administrative Assistant; Tommy Polson, Facilities Maintenance Manager; Linda Vos, Accountant; and Mike Petruconis, Parish Administrator.

Community Life

Community Life accomplished many things despite the setbacks from COVID. Our committee reached out personally to each and every family in our parish at the onset of the pandemic to check on them and see if there was anything we could do to help them through the initial days of confinement, keep them informed on how to stay connected with our parish and just to talk, spend time on the phone and offer prayer and friendship.

We continued our Donut Sunday tradition via Zoom. Anyone who wanted could participate by bringing their coffee and treats to the online chat. It was a way to keep connected to other parishioners and see familiar faces. As restrictions loosened, we moved to “Grab & Go” Donut Sundays in February. Despite some bitterly cold Sundays, cars lined up to grab a donut or two to bring home after morning Mass. As the year came to a close, we were finally able to return to the Social Hall to enjoy coffee, donuts and fellowship with others.

Although plans for our annual Gather festival last September had to be put on hold, we did still celebrate Gather Sunday with our traditional Mass on the Grass on the south lawn. It was a beautiful day, bringing our community together for the first time in months, while social distancing and following COVID protocols.

In the fall, Community Life and Social Justice collaborated to create a Peace Walk on church grounds. Beginning at the Peace Pole in front of the main entrance, the Peace Walk circled the south lawn, stopping at seven different stations before ending in the Memorial Garden. Each station focused

on one of the seven pillars of Catholic Social Teaching, which are the basis of our Catholic Faith. Participants could come any time of day, go at their own pace, and spend some quiet time in prayer and reflection.

We celebrated National Marriage Week in February by participating in a seven-day, at-home retreat. It was a week of reflection and prayer on the gift marriage is to our Church and country, including daily marriage tips on our Facebook page. On Saturday night, we hosted the virtual event “To Have, To Hold, To Honor” for married couples to come together, sharing time and playing a few games. Although unable to enjoy a dinner and wine together in our usual fashion, several couples took advantage of an option to order dinner to-go from Carmine’s, with a portion of the proceeds donated to St. Edward. The week finished up with a special blessing for married couples during weekend Mass.

As the Lenten season approached, Community Life volunteers worked with both the worship and communication teams to put together special take-home Lenten Kits. The kits included resources on praying the rosary, the little black books, *Lenten Gospel Reflections* from Bishop Robert Barron, and some other Lenten goodies. The kits were passed out after Mass on February 14, and during Drive-Thru Ash Distribution on Ash Wednesday. *(pictured on the Worship page)*

As our Community Life Commission looks forward, we are happy to say we will indeed Gather and celebrate and be thankful as we return to a more “normal” and joyful year ahead.

Faith Formation



As we reflect on this past year, the losses were significant. For youth AND parents! Many parents worked full time and homeschooled their kids, missing special moments like watching their child walk across a stage for their diploma or introducing their newborn to extended family. Our youth missed out on mission trips, annual retreats and events like our Bloomington broomball tournament. While it's easy to see only the losses, some highlights from this past year include:

Camp Eddie, our week-long elementary summer day camp, met outside on the lawn and learned what it means to be a Hero for God. They enjoyed tie-dye, obstacle courses, a dunk tank, worship songs and winning keys for our Prize Box!

In the fall we held a hybrid program on Wednesday nights for youth in elementary through high school. But as Covid cases rose, we moved fully online. On Zoom we had scavenger hunts, talent shows, Holy Yoga and we learned about so much, like the Blueprints God has for our lives, prayer, how the Sacraments bring us closer to God and each other and so much more. Our incredible youth ministry team and Acts 29 high school leaders were there each week to lead an online small group. They didn't let masks or computer screens stop them from building relationships and showing what it looks like to live for Jesus. We ended the year in person for our post-Confirmation group, Base Camp, worshipping at bonfires, walking the Stations of the Cross and celebrating our Seniors.

Sunday School was fully online at the "regular" time, meeting each week for Bible videos, weekly lesson topics, craft projects and discussion. While our student volunteers were missed, we were able to cover more content than we would have in-person and still have fun and form friendships.

The Sacraments of First Communion and Confirmation were celebrated for 2020 and 2021. There were Zoom Bible studies, family game nights, a digital Advent calendar and a Valentine's Day drive thru to kick off Lent. The Knights of Columbus hosted a takeout version of our Lenten Fish Fry, raising funds for a youth room patio. (*pictured on the Administration page*)

Adult Faith Formation programs continued to be offered online with Bible studies that focused on the knowing and living the Catholic faith through the *Symbolon* series. The faith study *The Search* challenged participants to look at their faith journey and think about their final destination. During the Advent Season parishioners took the *Road to Bethlehem* with reflections and scripture readings to help enrich the understanding and spiritual journey of Advent.

A special collaboration with the Social Justice & Charity team led to a discussion group examining the issue of racism and the pastoral letter *Open Wide Our Hearts*. Everyone was invited to participate Wednesdays throughout the month of October, with a focus on caring for all members of our community, honoring each person as unique, sacred, and created in the image of God.

Sacramental preparation also continued throughout the year. We completed RCIA preparation online and welcomed four RCIA candidates as fully initiated Catholics at the end of July. Baptism and Marriage preparation also continued online with families and couples seeking the Sacraments; while some of these celebrations were postponed, many others opted to celebrate wearing masks.

Pastoral Care

Although many of our ministries were shut down due to COVID, members of the Pastoral Care team reached out to as many parishioners as they were able through personal phone calls and mailings; checking in on their needs and offering comfort and assistance.

One ministry that thrived throughout the year was the Prayer Shawl Ministry. Knitters kept busy creating these comforting gifts, meaning those who requested a shawl were still able to receive one. Twelve prayer shawls were given to Ridges Hospital for the Spiritual Care department to give to actively dying patients.

The Memorial Garden Committee kept busy keeping our garden beautiful throughout last summer, completing a fall clean-up in November. When spring arrived, our Cub Scout Pack held a spring clean-up in preparation for planting.

Funerals were celebrated with capacity limits in place in the beginning of the year. Family and friends unable to attend in-person were able to watch a live stream or video recording right from our website or YouTube, thanks to updates and improvements in both our worship technology and communications. Capacity limits ended as the year closed out, causing a rush of families who had waited out the pandemic to schedule a celebration of life for their deceased loved ones. Funeral luncheons and visitation also resumed beginning in June.

For families and friends grieving the loss of a loved one, Grief Support sessions were held virtually, first through the Downtown Grief Support Group, and later through the

Bloomington-Richfield Grief Coalition. In-person sessions were finally scheduled to return this July, and will be held at St. Edward for the first time in several years.

Our Homebound Communion Ministry returned mid-year, and a plea for help resulting in several new volunteers stepping up to be trained for this important and rewarding ministry.

Stephen Ministers continued to serve their care receivers as best they could. Beginning the year with phone and Zoom calls, they were later allowed to meet one-on-one following strict COVID protocols. As the year ended, they began meeting as a large group for continuing education, and were able to place new care receivers with Stephen Ministers.

Although our own Hospital Ministry was sidelined, St. Edward helped spread the word about the newly formed Anointing Corps, a specially trained group of priests who were allowed to minister to area hospitals. Parishioners were encouraged to sign up for the Anointing Corps Prayer Support Ministry. Participants received an alert every time one of the priests was dispatched to minister to a patient. They were asked to offer an anonymous intercession, including saying an “Our Father” for the patient, one “Hail Mary” for the patient’s family and friends, and one “Glory Be” in thanksgiving for the priest and the healthcare team.

Throughout the year, Fr. Rick continued to celebrate the Sacraments of Anointing and Reconciliation individually by appointment.

Social Justice & Charity

Over the past year, Social Justice & Charity ministries played a key role in helping many in our community and beyond.

The Dudley Emergency Fund assisted people financially impacted by job loss or temporary furloughs. It helped with rent, utility bills, medical expenses, car repairs and other various necessary costs. Since the fiscal year began, the Dudley Fund has given out \$51,291 in emergency funds to help people make ends meet.

While many activities were suspended, the Wine & Weeding group gathered throughout the summer of 2020 to nurture and harvest the VEGGIES 4 VEAP giving garden. As summer moved into fall, nearly 400 pounds of fresh cucumbers, carrots, green beans, zucchini, tomatoes, beets and peppers were donated to the VEAP Food Pantry in Bloomington. In addition to fresh veggies from our garden, St. Edward continued to collect donations of non-perishable food, paper products and toiletries for VEAP throughout the year. Donation receipts totaled over 6,563 pounds of food since the beginning of the quarantine.

Initially suspended as the year began, St. Edward Meals on Wheels volunteers returned to service as usual in the communities of Bloomington and Eden Prairie. St. Edward volunteers drive and deliver meals one week on a six-week rotation. Currently twenty drivers deliver food to ten different routes during that week.

Although the year started with Loaves & Fishes locations closed down, St. Edward continued to financially support the two locations previously served by our teams of volunteers; St. Stephen's in Minneapolis, and Creekside Community Center in Bloomington. Mid-year, as Loaves & Fishes

changed locations and resumed operations, a new site coordinator for St. Edward stepped forward. Now serving monthly at the new location, Oak Grove Presbyterian in Bloomington, our volunteers serve approximately 200 meals to those in need in our community.

In late April, we celebrated a "Sister Parish weekend." Parishioners Sue Kellett and Ann McGuire recorded a video message that was played during Mass, updating everyone on how both communities were doing during the pandemic. In addition, members of the Social Justice Commission read the prayers of the faithful, and a second collection was taken. A total of \$4,800 in donations was divided evenly between the Teresa Toda Home, our Sister Community in the Dominican Republic, and Our Lady of the Angels, our Sister Parish in Nicaragua.

The Respect Life committee held the Mother's Day Baby Shower Collection in May of 2021. Thanks to generous donors, the collection was very successful. Lots of clothing, diapers, gift cards, and baby supplies were received, in addition to \$1,120.00 in cash and checks. All donations benefitted Southwest Options for Women in Eden Prairie, and Birthright of Minneapolis. Both agencies assist women and couples who are facing a crisis pregnancy, encouraging them to choose life over abortion.

A new Outreach Program Committee was recently formed that will be granting funds to outside organizations that submit a proposal for a grant. Currently, the new structure for the program, new grant forms, and a communications plan are under development.

Worship

The fiscal year started with many changes and adjustments to accommodate COVID-19 protocols. The St. Ed's CREW was formed and members were trained in the new protocols as we returned to in-person Masses gradually over a period of several weeks in early summer. We also coordinated with all liturgical ministers to keep them up to date with the many ongoing changes to procedures throughout the year.

At the end of July 2020, we hired a new Director of Music, Andrew Walker. Andrew made numerous improvements to our music program, including transitioning to new software for managing the musician scheduling process. This allowed musicians easier access to all sheet music and audio files (for online and mobile devices.) Other music highlights over the past year include:

- Musicians from St. Edward participated in making a special Christmas music video with others from our Archdiocese (*Night of Silence/Silent Night*)
- Produced a worship music video for the song *Lord I Need You* as a proof of concept for future worship music videos with our music ministry and received over 2,500+ views

In September, we celebrated a very successful outdoor Mass on the Grass on "Gather Sunday." Other special liturgy highlights throughout the year included the Mass of Remembrance, Advent, Christmas, Holy Week, Easter, Holy Days, Confirmation, and First Communion. In addition, we created several unique opportunities for celebrating the sacraments including:

- General Absolution Reconciliation during both Advent and Lent seasons
- Drive-Thru Ash Distribution on Ash Wednesday
- Drive-Up Holy Communion

This March, the worship space was updated with new ceiling paint and carpet. As part of this update, the organ console was relocated from the music area to the back of the church, creating more available space for future musicians in the music area. It also allows the organ to be moved to the front of the worship space whenever needed, allowing for possible future organ performances.

Over the past year, improvements were made to our Art & Environment and worship technology, enabling us to enrich both our online and in-person worship experience by:

- Utilizing our live streaming capabilities, including making significant improvements to the quality of our live stream throughout the year
- Upgrading our projection software
- Adding pre-recorded Prayers of the Faithful once per month to help foster a sense of connection and involvement with many different groups in the parish
- Producing a new introduction segment every week for our live stream audience connecting them to events and opportunities at St. Edward

This June, we expanded our schedule to include opportunities to worship with us all seven days of the week.

Financial Highlights

As you will note from the Financial Report, St. Edward incurred a small operating deficit for the year in the amount of \$6,793. During a global pandemic, a deficit this small is truly a blessing from God!

There were a couple of extraordinary income items to note. We received forgiveness on our Paycheck Protection Plan loan in the amount of \$172,164. These funds were used to pay employees during the height of the pandemic when there was much uncertainty. We received a \$94,058 Employee Retention Credit (ERC), which was also passed by Congress to assist employers throughout the country. We expect to receive final ERC payments in 2021-2022.

Offertory collections were down slightly; 4% as compared to the previous year.

* Investment income is comprised of realized interest, dividends, and sales of investments (stocks, mutual funds, etc.) along with unrealized gains/losses on the market value changes of the investments. **Unrealized gains account for \$251,865 of this balance.** Therefore, only \$54,810 has a cash impact on our financial condition.

Cash and Investments without restrictions can be used for any purpose in performing the primary mission of the parish. They have flexibility and can be directed to the most strategic ministry initiatives identified by leadership. Cash and investments with restrictions must be used for the specific purpose designated by the donor.

The parish regularly monitors liquidity required to meet its operating needs and other contractual commitments, while also striving to maximize the investment of its available funds. The current balance of cash will meet 60 days of normal operating expenses with the excess invested in an agency account at Catholic Community Foundation.

As we plan for the new year, we look with great optimism to the return of more in-person activities, programs, classes, studies, and sacramental life. We do however, foresee an operating deficit of \$168,830. While we have the resources to absorb this in the short term, we still have work to do and need your help to arrive at a stable and balanced operating budget. Your offertory contributions in the current fiscal year can help eliminate this budget shortfall.

Although we have challenges still ahead, the Church of St. Edward has been blessed by God, and by the dedication and support from all of you. Let us look to the future with the virtue of Christian hope that we are endowed with by Christ Himself.

ENDOWMENTS

As we plan for the future, we recognize the need for a stable financial base in order that St. Edward may effectively address the expansion of ministries and other needs which arise and require attention. St. Edward has designated a portion of unrestricted resources to establish a quasi endowment fund. Our Operating Legacy Fund is invested with Morgan Stanley for the purpose of creating a stable income for future generations. These funds are invested for long term appreciation and current income. No portion of the principal is intended to be used but remains available. The investment committee oversees the Operating Legacy Fund and manages the earnings.

LEGACY PLANNING

When you meet with your attorney to review your will, trust and beneficiary designations, it is a good time to consider including the parish as a beneficiary, if you have not previously done so. Adding the parish as one of your IRA beneficiaries can be the most tax-effective way to make a legacy gift to St. Edward.
